



The WOC 2020 Virtual Symposium

INAUGURAL WOC SYMPOSIUM ENCOURAGES WOMEN TO STAND OUT AND SHINE

In the six months since its inception, WOC is making a difference. With nearly 900 members, self-assessment tools, numerous resources and programs, WOC is fulfilling its mission of championing women of color and equipping them with personal and professional development tools to ensure their success.

The inaugural WOC Symposium (#woc2020Symposium), held on November 17, was designed to provide women of color fundraising and philanthropy professionals and their allies, with tools to forge ahead in their lives and careers. The virtual event generated more than 300 attendees from across the country. Participants had the option of pursuing one of three event tracks: fundraising, philanthropy, or allyship. With 18 sessions, more than 30 speakers, a Career Fair, and a variety of drop-in options, there was something for everyone.

The WOC Symposium's formal program began with the "WOC Up this Morning" opening session, which highlighted the spirit of the event – radiance, beauty, and power. The theme was underscored by a viola solo performance of the Spiritual, "I Woke Up this Morning," by Castle of Our Skins Co-Founder and Executive Director Ashleigh Gordon. Gordon's moving rendition of the gospel song, which was immortalized as an anthem of the civil rights movement, highlighted the need for women of color to claim their power and value. Gordon's performance was followed by a welcome from WOC Founder Yolanda F. Johnson, who encouraged WOC women to unabashedly embrace their standing as beacons of light and to find inspiration on the path to professional and personal success.

Johnson also announced tools to facilitate that journey, including WOC's latest endeavor, the Radiant Leadership Institute, for which applications are currently being accepted, WOC's Mentor Match service, which pairs candidates with a leading development professional to help them outline their career trajectories, and Check-in Chicas, an accountability partnership program in which participants work with an executive to set and achieve professional goals, launching in early 2021.

Professional goal attainment was a major component of the Symposium, as evidenced by the Career Fair. With over 15 exhibitors, the Career Fair provided tools for advancement, as well as access to opportunity. Prospective employers included Covenant House, the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, and Elevate, among others. Attendees were able to introduce themselves and

ask questions, listen to a company overview, and receive vital tips on the application process. For many candidates, the one-on-one personal interaction with a recruiter provided a unique opportunity to make a distinct impression.

Throughout the day, those seeking downtime visited exhibition booths to learn more about WOC, shop, and obtain resources to support professional achievement. Attendees viewed merchandise at WOC's new online store, including Philanthrotees wall art, and tote bags. All Philanthrotees purchases underscored the essence of philanthropy, as 10 percent of proceeds support charitable organizations. Exhibition booths such as Keela and ToucanTech provided demos of communications and data management software, critical tools for for fundraising professionals. Representatives from graduate programs like Baruch College's Master of Public Administration and Columbia University's M.S in Nonprofit Management also provided inspiration for attendees to forge new and higher career paths within the field.

A recurring event theme was self-care and its connection to professional and personal advancement. WOC offered attendees a number of related sessions, including a morning meditation, skincare and makeup workshops, and "Just Breathe: Self-Care, Tips, and Tools," which addressed anxiety, stress management and reflection. In the closing panel, "Think Big: Using Our Talents and Resources to Achieve What We Want Out of Life and Work," panelist Jackie Copeland, founder and CEO of The Women Invested to Save Earth Fund and founder of Black Philanthropy Month, shared powerful reflections. Copeland reminded WOC women that living their best lives begins with recognizing their self-worth.

"One of the most powerful things that we can do to take care of our community is to take care of ourselves," Copeland said.

Copeland urged attendees to eschew the superwoman mentality and prioritize their self-care, reminding them of the sense of community that can be created and leveraged when women come together "to support each other freely and unconditionally."

As Johnson closed the formal program, she echoed those sentiments, encouraging women of color to avoid assimilation and to "stand out and shine as the amazing people that you are." She emphasized the importance of harnessing their unique talents to maximize their potential and change the world.
